## Hunter Wine Legends Awarded

### PJ Charteris/Brokenwood Cellar Door

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THOSE who bring the Hunter's most delightful drops to the tables of the world were honoured at the Hunter Valley Wine Industry Awards last night.

Christopher Barnes was inducted as a Hunter Valley living legend in recognition of his 40-year involvement with the region's wine industry.

Mr Barnes joins other industry legends Max Drayton, John Tulloch, Perc McGuigan and Brian McGuigan.

Brokenwood Wines winemaker PJ Charteris was named winemaker of the year and young-gun winemaker Matt Burton, of Wandin Valley Estate, was crowned rising star of the year.

Mr Burton was awarded two trophies and eight gold medals in the 2009 Hunter Valley Wine Show, while Mr Charteris has produced the NSW wine of the year and The Penguin Good Australian Wine Guide wine of the year for 2010.

Brett Keeping, of Two Rivers, a 22-year veteran of the Hunter wine industry, was named viticulturist of the year. Brokenwood Wines was named cellar door of the year. Drayton's Family Wines' "Old Cellar" and Audrey Wilkinson Vineyard's "Old Vats" both won the heritage award.
